SNOWMAN SCREENINGS


Screenings of The Snowman™ film will take place on selected dates in December:

1 Partridge in a Pear Tree

Hillsborough's Walled Garden is home to many traditional pear tree varieties, but you would be unlikely to see a partridge roosting in their branches because they are mainly ground-dwelling birds!

2 Turtle Doves

The Hill family traditionally paid an annual rent of two white doves to the Crown allowing them to hold a market in Hillsborough.

3 French Hens

As a child, Lady Alice Hill presented a cup at the Hillsborough Castle show every year for the 'best pen of fowls – 3 hens and a cockerel'.

4 Calling Birds

Colly is an old English word for coalblack so the colly birds referred to in the original version of the 12 Days of Christmas song were black birds. In later versions this was changed to calling birds – which are songbirds.

5 Gold Rings

In 1813, over 4000 guineas worth of jewels and money was stolen from the Hill family's house in London, including a gold ring bearing the family's crest. Ten years later the ring washed up on a Welsh beach following a shipwreck!

6 Geese a Laying

Northern Ireland annually hosts migrating geese from Canada. Their first stop is Strangford Lough before dispersing across the island. 7 Swans a Swimming

His Majesty the King holds the right to all swans in open water in England and Wales but only exercises this right in the Thames.

8 Maids a Milking

Hillsborough Castle used to have its own dairy to supply milk, butter and cheese for the household. An accounts book from 1815 shows that the yearly wage of Mrs Harrison, the dairy maid, was just £17.

9 Ladies Dancing

On 6th January 1828, the Marchioness of Downshire hosted a Twelfth Night Ball at Hillsborough Castle. This was to mark the last of the twelve days of festivity that had begun on Christmas Day. Guests arrived at 9pm for dancing and the feast was served at 2am! O Lords a Leaping

On Christmas Eve 1849, the pantomime Tom Thumb was performed at the Castle to celebrate Lord Hillsborough's fifth birthday. The star of the show was a cow from the Castle's farm, which was led on stage to play the part of the cow who swallowed Tom Thumb!

11 Pipers Piping

The gardeners at Hillsborough Castle sometimes find parts of clay smoking pipes while they are digging! They were probably discarded by gardeners who worked here in Victorian times.

12 Drummers Drumming

The 12 drummers are the last gift given in The 12 Days of Christmas song. If you add up all the gifts given on each day during each round of the song, the total number of gifts is 364!
